I would like to thank Kathy Bruce for all her work in organising this.

During the workshop, it became apparent that Catherine Hamilton has an incredible knowledge of colour, and she has offered to run another workshop for us called "the Language of Colour". This is a workshop in acrylics about colour, but essentially for all media. Spotlight On..... Jill Scanlon




My love of art began when I won a Certificate at the age of six from a Road Safety Campaign "Colouring In" competition. I progressed to drawing faces at the age of ten to make calendars, which my long suffering family dutifully hung up. I took Art "O" level at school instead of French and my art teacher informed me that I would begin to paint when I learnt to paint with a brush and not with a pencil! Not entirely encouraging I thought!

However, I discovered the truth of my Art teacher, when I purchased at the age of 18, a Rowney Oil Painting Set, while on holiday with my family in Ilfracombe in the West Country. I proceeded to pick some pansies and nasturtiums, stuck them in a

bowl and drew them on the oil painting paper provided in the art set. So graphite and oil do not mix! I had to learn to "draw" with a brush! Once I had mastered the "paint with a brush thing" not a pencil, I really loved oils, so I painted happily and my dad framed and then sold them!

I then branched out into crafts and I supplemented my student allowance with another art form, designing and then making dolls from wire and cloth, which I sold for the princely sum of 21/- (about

\$2). Since then I have always loved arts and crafts, joining with my husband to decorate/paint the 1:12 scale doll's houses he makes. I design dolls and make furniture for his houses. I also make toys of any kind, knitted and sewn. I sporadically sell these and my husband and I won the Dolls House Ist prize at the Albury Wodonga Doll, Bear and Hobby Show two years ago. My latest enterprise has been writing and illustrating a book dedicated to my grandson to



In Art I have been to John Wilson oil painting workshops, where I have learnt a lot about technique and greatly enjoyed expanding my skills in oil painting.

Heather Sparks talked me into joining AWAS several years ago and I have never regretted it. I am a never ending story with Acrylic painting, hoping that one day I will enjoy it as much as oils! I have sold paintings at the Wandiligong Nut Festival, the Aspect Art Show and the Holbrook Art

Workshop Reports

"Innovative Pastels" Workshop with Catherine Hamilton – 30th and 31st July.

In this workshop tutored by Catherine Hamilton, an artist from the Mornington Peninsula, members had the opportunity to learn some innovative techniques in the approach to painting with soft pastels on both canvas and specialised pastel paper. Her approach consisted of first applying an underpainting of bright colour to the support using acrylic paints or inks, then creating a "toothy" ground for subsequent pastel painting over the colour, using clear pastel primer.

Each participant came to the workshop with different prior experiences with the medium and with different expectations.

Here are some of the responses participants made after the workshop:

"The resulting works that the class produced were a testimonial to Catherine's teaching abilities, given that many of us were completely new to the world of pastel painting."

"I loved the ink underpainting method she showed us and I came away inspired to continue exploring pastels over underpainting."

"The workshop was inspiring-especially using inks to create a richly coloured ground on the Colourfix." (Special pastel paper)

"I like how free the tutor was and how experimental she was."

"The extra knowledge gleaned from the workshop has given me more confidence with the medium."

"I learnt a lot from this workshop and will apply the use of more glowing colours to my underpainting and especially concentrate on the lost and found edges."

"It was a fun workshop and Catherine is such a book of knowledge. She is an amazing teacher who builds confidence in her students."

"I enjoyed Cathy's entertaining approach to the workshop. She came across as an extremely experienced teacher knowledgeable on colour, pastel techniques and general artist information." Handy Art tips:

- To enlarge your photo to canvas size; place pic on lower LHS of canvas, draw a diagonal up to the top RHS. Any point along the extended diagonal will give you a corner measure point for the horizontal/vertical edge of your new picture.
- Masking tape around your painting on paper- use low tack and cream coloured, not distracting coloured tape. Remove tape pulling AWAY from your artwork.
- Use complimentary colours for your underpainting for a more "glowing" effect.
- Apply pastel lightly –just "kiss the canvas."

It was a stimulating weekend. We all appreciated the opportunity to learn from a tutor with a great depth of knowledge and she was extremely good at sharing her knowledge with us. Catherine's



accommodation was at The Paddlesteamer Motel, located on the NSW side of the river, enabling an easy early morning riverside walk to our studio at Gateway village. We shared a delicious Thai meal at the Thai Puka on Saturday evening.

Thanks to all the participants who helped make this workshop happen, and to those who had input in this "collaborative report."

Gateway Village Precinct Open Day

The planning for the annual "Gateway Island Open Day" is progressing well, it is to be held in conjunction with the Saturday morning market on 24th September from 8am to 1pm.

AWAS have made a commitment to have our studio open for public viewing and sales and to facilitate and supervise activities to entertain and encourage the public to participate. To this end it has been decided to have a number of card tables set up on our veranda with paper and watercolour or water based acrylic paints, where we encourage the children to paint their parents or siblings with our help and suggestions. This will require a couple of volunteers for each table.

Secondly we will set up two easels and tables somewhere in the village and hand out to the public numbered 10cm x 15cm cards with a section of a painting on the reverse side. Numbers on a gridded canvas will correspond to the numbers on the cards and the public will paint their section on the painting which when completed will be displayed in the Paint Box Gallery for sale with the proceeds going to charity. We will need a couple of very enthusiastic volunteers for this task as a lot of encouragement may be required to get the public to participate.

Finally, we would love to have a few members scattered around the site painting "plein air", weather permitting, to interact with the public, and along with the buskers encourage the public to enjoy the whole extent of the Gateway Village site.

Please volunteer for these activities which could prove to be a lot of fun especially if you get the viewers to contribute their artistic talents to your work. Remember we are trying to interact with the public. If you are up for a bit of fun and nonsense, please contact a committee member and keep the morning of Saturday 24th September free for your participation.
