# SPOTLIGHT ON KYLIE WALDON: EXHIBITING YOUR ARTWORK.

### Petrified of Showing Your Work?

I guess there is a hump or a closet for all artists that exists when it comes to showing others your artwork. Whether it's just another person or at an exhibition. And painting with other artists can seem daunting.

I know I felt like that when I returned to the art society after a 20 year gap. I had been a closet artist for years. The only people who knew I painted was my family, and they were often harsh critiques – expecting Rembrandts from a gouache/acrylic artist who loves colour is never going to impress. I also had an active inner critique that caused a lot of artwork to be burnt, ripped and binned because it 'wasn't good enough'.



This is a photo of me from 2013 with my first painting with the acrylics group and the first one I exhibited then.

I remember that first exhibition in 2013 like it was yesterday. I had been ill in my stomach for days. I had sweaty palms. I nearly passed out when I arrived to put my paintings in at the Wodonga Plant Farm. There were lots of artists and lots of amazing works. I didn't know anyone there except for one artist, and all the works looked way better than mine that I nearly ran home!

But I did it. I put my artwork in. I met lots of other artists, none of whom I could remember their names, and I visited the gallery four times during the month. I didn't sell my artwork, but my goodness I did feel like a huge hump had been crossed and I was out of the closet as an artist. I'd always felt my art was different, and was often also told this was so, which never made me feel accepted, but now I had achieved this one little (huge) step I would recommend it to anyone.

The second thing I did was attend the Acrylics Group (2<sup>nd</sup> Saturday of the month). Again, very confronting. I was so daunted by what everyone else was painting and how to use acrylics in different ways, their styles and their amazing works that I felt like a fish out of water. I told myself I would never be as good as these artists. But do you know, slowly I learned that I don't have to be the best artist ever. I don't have to compare my work to anyone else's work. We are all different. A buyer doesn't compare artwork so much; they look at each painting and if it means something to them or there is something about that painting that they like, then they buy it. In those early days I was petrified about being on the causeway on my own and nearly passed out if someone said they wanted to buy a painting or card!

Now I just focus on my own work and try to improve myself now and then or when I have time (I work full time!). I love trying new techniques, making lists of what I would like to paint and meeting new people and their art, even though just a few years ago that scared the heck out of me. And selling that first painting... well... no matter how much \$\$ it was its like B L I S S. And now I enjoy talking to the public when they come in, encouraging new members, and taking money for cards.

So, I really recommend taking a first step; come out of the closet as an artist. Share yourself and your work with other artists and you'll find yourself grow and improve in ways you never expected. If you're not sure what to do or how, there are plenty of artists in the society who know – just ask one of them! The buzz I get from interaction with artists may generate painting after painting weeks later. And I would recommend finding a like-minded group; one or several people you can paint with and enjoy that experience. As a member you can access the gallery on the causeway any time. Take advantage of it. Painting with others is great. Without judgement. With cuppa breaks. And turn off that internal critique just for a while. Be brave and take the first step. You can do it! I look forward to seeing you and your artwork when you are ready!
